The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. (Philippians 4:4-7)  ISIS, Ukraine crisis, Ebola, measles, racial violence and strifeand the list goes on. We are inundated with news of tragic situations which generate more fear than hope. What if you used these stories to spur you to prayer, rather than fretting or becoming more fearful? Try it for this Lenten season and discover the peace of God growing in you and spreading to others through you.  Lord, thank you that You are Lord even when the world seems threatening and out of control. Help me to experience Your peace and to help others find Your peace as well.	Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds. (Hebrews 10:23-24)  Working for peace is hard work. It demands hope in God's ultimate victory, courage to engage broken relationships and violence, and perseverance to stay the course.  Without the encouragement of others, working for peace is often impossible. Who can you encourage today in the work of peace? Don't let today end without sending a note, making a phone call, or personally encouraging someone who is working for peace.  Today we pray for those working hard for peace in conflicted situations, in the midst of broken relationships, and in the face of injustice. Spur them on and strengthen them. Stir in me a holy passion to constantly foster the work of Your peace in our world.	But I tell you, do not resist an evil person. (Matthew 5:39)  Do not repay anyone evil for evil Do not take revenge, my dear friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: "It is mine to avenge; I will repay," says the Lord Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. (Romans 12:17-21)  When we are faced with evil – really repugnant evil – somehow, some way, love must rule. Love cannot be vengeful, love cannot retaliate – and love cannot be passive.
